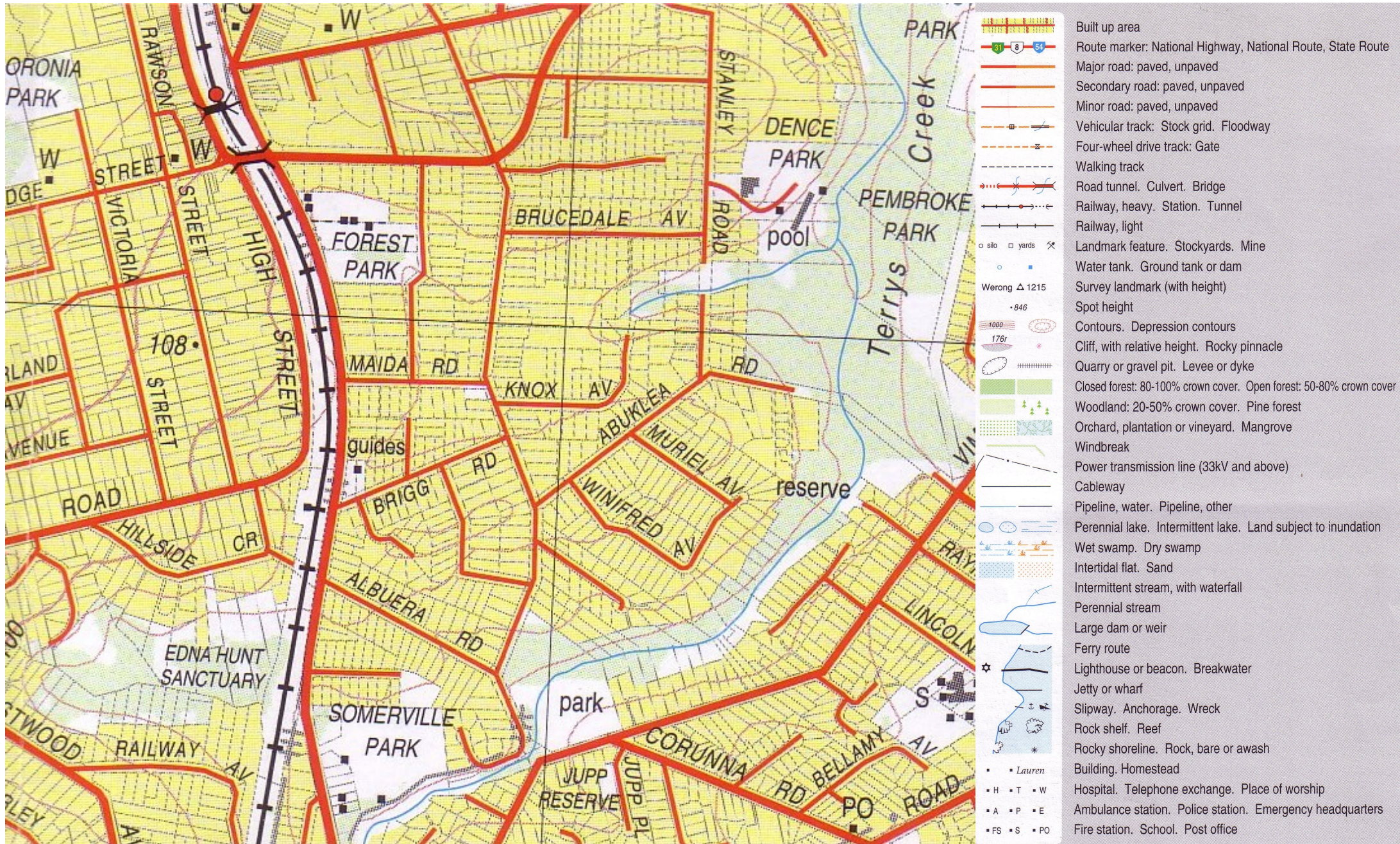
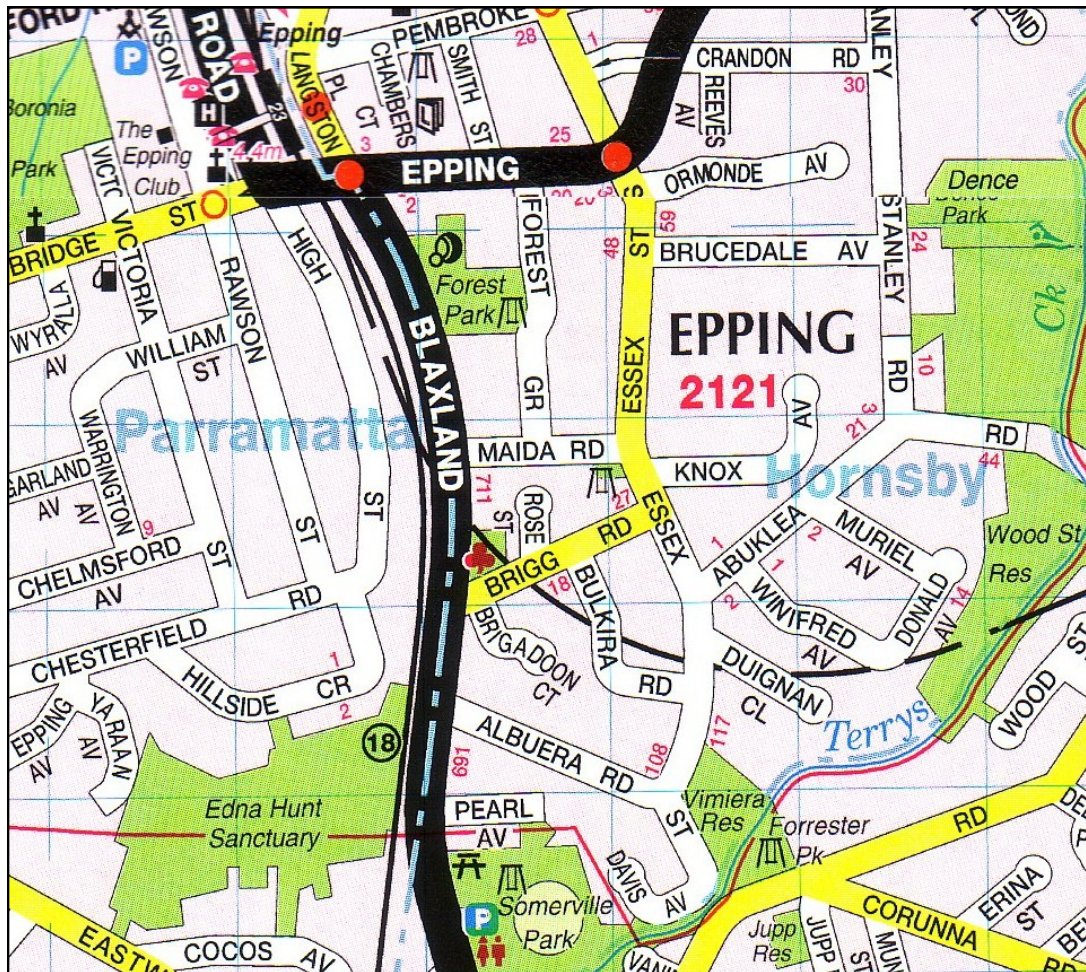


# TERRYS CREEK EASTWOOD-EPPING



- Built up area
- Route marker: National Highway, National Route, State Route
- Major road: paved, unpaved
- Secondary road: paved, unpaved
- Minor road: paved, unpaved
- Vehicular track: Stock grid. Floodway
- Four-wheel drive track: Gate
- Walking track
- Road tunnel. Culvert. Bridge
- Railway, heavy. Station. Tunnel
- Railway, light
- Landmark feature. Stockyards. Mine
- Water tank. Ground tank or dam
- Survey landmark (with height)
- Spot height
- Contours. Depression contours
- Cliff, with relative height. Rocky pinnacle
- Quarry or gravel pit. Levee or dyke
- Closed forest: 80-100% crown cover. Open forest: 50-80% crown cover
- Woodland: 20-50% crown cover. Pine forest
- Orchard, plantation or vineyard. Mangrove
- Windbreak
- Power transmission line (33kV and above)
- Cableway
- Pipeline, water. Pipeline, other
- Perennial lake. Intermittent lake. Land subject to inundation
- Wet swamp. Dry swamp
- Intertidal flat. Sand
- Intermittent stream, with waterfall
- Perennial stream
- Large dam or weir
- Ferry route
- Lighthouse or beacon. Breakwater
- Jetty or wharf
- Slipway. Anchorage. Wreck
- Rock shelf. Reef
- Rocky shoreline. Rock, bare or awash
- Building. Homestead
- Hospital. Telephone exchange. Place of worship
