Judge me by my behaviour (but try and understand my intention).....

For those who have read author Stephen Covey's work, you may recognise the title of this article from his quote ***"We judge ourselves by our intentions and others by their behaviour."***

Put simply, we can't read others minds, so we judge people's behaviour when forming our conclusions. Conversely, we as humans are willing to excuse our own behaviour on the basis that we have good intentions, regardless of our actions or the impact that they have.

We see this far too often in our movement. A leader, tired after a long day at work, sarcastically says to a new parent who has offered to stay and help at a meeting night *'Oh, wonderful. Finally, a parent shows up. They do exist'*. The intention may have been to highlight the support that we lack from the Group's parents. We would even consider justifying our sarcasm, because we are tired. However, I doubt this conversation has encouraged the parent to come back the next week to help. Then we are left wondering why they haven't come back.

We also see conflict between leaders across our movement that saps time in resolution and demotivates even the most resilient of volunteers. Why does this occur, when we are here to support the development of the youth? Volunteer organisations all over the world have a similar challenge.

We have extremely high expectations of our peers, often forgetting that they are volunteers like ourselves. Inevitably each of us fails to meet that expectation, as the needs of family and career take a greater priority. Interestingly, when we ourselves fail to deliver, we judge our 'intentions' in the failure. Why is this?

To overcome human nature, we look to our core values: the Scout Law and Promise. It is up to each of us as leaders to role model the Scout Laws: Being Respectful (being friendly, considerate and caring for others) and Doing What is Right (being trustworthy, honest and fair) in the same way we expect the youth to.





Troops are also reminded that if you have special diets you need to accommodate with extra cooking gear to avoid cross contamination. Troops will also need to only use Blue Food Grade hoses, as no others will be allowed.

Sky High Outdoors Challenge Program

Scouts were asked to host a special program that UTS run, called the *Sky High Outdoor Challenge Program*. This program run through NSW High Schools is aimed at Year 8 and 9 students who have been identified as 'at risk of falling off the grid' for a number of reasons.

So we took up the call of hosting this program at Bundilla; over 4 days we would run a initiative program for up to 30 students per day from all over Sydney.

Day 1 we had 25 students from East Hills Boys High, Ashton High and Chester Hill High

Day 2 we had 23 students from Birrong Boys High, Birrong Girls High and Merrylands High

Day 3 we had 12 students from Lurnea High and James Busby High

Day 4 we had nearly the full amount of students, 28 in all from JJ Cahill High, Sir Joseph Banks High, Cabramatta High.

The program finished each day with everyone breaking into teams to prepare lunch for everyone; some were allocated to chop the onions for the BBQ; some were allocated to prepare the salads; some were allocated to cooking the sausages and of course some were allocated to serving. The cooking was fantastic and lunch was awesome.



Some of the challenges we ran were simple enough, cost effective and based on the patrol system.

Ping Pong Railway



Nuclear Power Station clean up

Spider Web



Feather Stick (sorry no photos of this activity), but it does require a temporary wall about 160 cm high, soccer balls and number of large dowels 180 cm long! The final challenge was to **Pitch a 6 man tent**.

GWS REGION ACTIVITIES


I can't wait till those warmer days of spring start to really kick in.....*bring it on!*





ESCAPE ROOM


2nd Baulkham Hills Rover Crew headed to the Labyrinth Escape Rooms in Parramatta.

NSW Scouts requires that all new Leaders are given an Introductory Kit – available from the Region Office at a cost of \$20 each. The kit contains a letter from NSW Scouts and two Welcome to Scouting booklets. The price of the kit also includes the GWS admin fee and the shoulder badges a Leader receives with their Certificate of Adult Leadership when their training is complete.

Purchase of the sectional books for the new Leader is recommended. They contain many great resources still relevant in the current youth program and useful programming ideas for the future.


